

Dear Families,

Today your children were placed in their classrooms for the 2024/2025 school year! This is an exciting time of year, for both children and caregivers. Educators have spent many hours discussing class placements. We look at each child individually, and decide where their best learning environment will be. Keep in mind that many factors are considered when placing children including:

- Classroom teacher and school-based team recommendations
- The overall make up of the class being created
- Learning styles Intellectual, emotional, social & physical development
- Behavioral issues
- Need for additional services such as learning assistance, ELL, and Education Assistants Student leadership skills
- Pre-existing conflicts between children
- Provincial legislation for class size and composition
- Pre-existing supportive relationships between children

Combined Classes: We have some combined classes this year. Some of you may have concerns about your child being placed in a combined-grade class, where students from different grades learn together. I want to reassure you that combined-grade classes are a common and well-established educational practice in Canada. In fact, research indicates that one in every five Canadian students experiences a combined-grade classroom during their elementary years and thrives in classrooms structured this way.

I encourage you to be positive with your children as they come home from school today. When we show that we are scared, uncertain, or nervous about the new year, they too will feel these emotions. Staying positive, and sharing with our children that this is an exciting time of year will make your children feel better. If they are not placed with a friend they were hoping to be with, this is a great opportunity to practice and build resilience, and share that this will be a great opportunity to make even more friends! Requests for classroom changes will not be accommodated.

Accidents Happen

The Burnaby School district does not insure expenses for student injuries that happen on school grounds or during school activities. Parents and guardians are responsible for these expenses. Whether it's playing sports, using playground equipment, or simply having fun in the gym or in the schoolyard, accidents sometimes happen. The Medical Services Plan (MSP) either limits or does not cover some charges and group health plans often have deductibles. Costs that are not covered by MSP or may be limited by group health plans may include:

- Dental treatment
- Eyeglasses
- Physiotherapy

Accident Insurance

For many years the district arranged for families to voluntarily purchase student accident insurance

through the Kids Plus[™] Accident Insurance program. That program has been replaced by the Family Accident Reimbursement Plan provided by Industrial Alliance. This voluntary plan provides coverage for students and their families against accidental injury, unexpected medical expenses, and critical illness. DPAC General Meeting Dates for upcoming 2024/25 school year:

Who can become a member of DPAC?

DPACs are composed of elected parent representatives from PACs and serves as an umbrella organization for the PACs in their school district.

What does DPAC do?

DPACs support and encourage PACs and parents in accessing the school system at all levels by providing regular forums for the exchange of ideas and information to ensure that public education serves the best interests of all students.

The Role of an Elected DPAC Representative:

The roles, duties and responsibilities of elected DPAC representatives vary from DPAC to DPAC and PAC to PAC.

Generally, DPAC representatives:

- Act as a liaison between the PAC and DPAC by attending DPAC meetings
- Communicate and obtain information to and from PAC
- Bring forward issues that may be common to more than one school

What does DPAC NOT do?

DPACs are not a venue to discuss individual students or staff problems or conflicts.
